

***Clematis jackmannii* types, Clematis.**

(sun/psh)(Zones 3-9)(vining)

No garden is complete without Clematis. If one planned carefully, there could be a Clematis in bloom from April to October. Whether you want huge, vibrant flowers in a range of hues, or a demure woodlander who demands a second glance, this genus has it all. Remember Clematis like to have their roots in the shade and leaves in the sun, so take this into consideration when you plant. We have an ever-expanding selection.

**A. *C. jackmannii* type 'Countess of Lovelace'.** This boasts luscious, fully-double blue-purple flowers in spring and maybe again in fall. The autumn blooms will have only a single row of petals.

**B. *C. jackmannii* type 'Alabast' (Poulala).** Very round, large greenish-white flowers with yellow anthers.

**C. *C. jackmannii* type 'Evening Star' (Evista).** A beautiful pure white selection of floriferous, vigorous plants.

**D. *C. jackmannii* type 'Fireworks'.** A new selection with bi-colored flowers. Each petal is bright pink on the edges and satiny purple down the center. Very distinctive.

**E. *C. jackmannii* type 'Madame Baron Veillard'.** One of the older cultivars with large, bluish pink flowers.

**F. *C. jackmannii* type 'Multi-Blue'.** One of the oldest doubles with very dark, very double purple flowers. Blooms in spring and sometimes again in fall.

**G. *C. jackmannii* type 'Pink Champagne'.** A rosy-pink flowering form that is compact and repeat blooming.

**H. *C. jackmannii* type 'Rouge Cardinal'.** A deep, velvety red clematis with red anthers. A heavy bloomer.

**I. *C. jackmannii* type 'Vyvyan Pennell'.** One of the best blue doubles. The fully double blooms are produced on the old growth, while the semi-double are produced on the current season's.

***Clematis paniculata*, Sweet Autumn Clematis.**

(sun/sh)(Zones 3-9)(vining)

This vigorous vine waits all summer before it starts its parade of tiny white flowers in August. The flowers are very fragrant and are a harbinger of autumn. This has escaped into the woods in our area and caution should be used when planting near fragile ecosystems.

***Clematis pitcheri*, Clematis.**

(psh/sh)(Zones 5-9)(vining)

A superb clematis for growing through a shrub or tree, this delights with its nodding bells of reddish-purple. The flowers have a leathery texture and occur in summer. Very long blooming.

***Clematis tangutica* 'Radar Love', Clematis.**

(sun/psh)(Zones 5-9)(vining)

An Asian Clematis with bright yellow, nodding flowers that occur in profusion in spring. The flowers are small, but have great appeal en masse.

***Decumaria barbara* 'Barbara Ann', Woodvamp.**

(psh/sh)(Zones 5-9)(vining)

We are quite enamored with this plant, which could most aptly be described as a native climbing Hydrangea. This clinging vine is native in the southern US coastal plain and throughout the deep south. Fortunately, the plant is quite hardy and easy to grow in a moist, shady spot. The leaves are apple green and of very heavy substance. Clusters of white flowers occur in June and last for 2 weeks. A fabulous vine which is much faster

growing than the Asian species. Intolerant of drought.

***Hedera helix*, English Ivy**

(sun/psh)(Zones 5-9)(varies)

This has to be one of the most genetically diverse species on the planet. There are hundreds of named forms, both juvenile and adult, that can accommodate the gardener's every need. These are thought of as shade plants, but do well in full sun when combined with annuals in mixed container plantings. Many of the less vigorous forms are excellent companions for Hostas in the shade garden. Our thanks to Sabina Sulgrove, the former taxonomist from the Ivy Society for identifying many of our selections for us.

**A. H.h. 'California Fan'.** Like, one of the best Ivies for its wide, fan-shaped leaves that undulate wildly. Totally killer, dude.

**B. H.h. 'Duckfoot'.** This is one of my favorites. Clumping mounds of tiny foliage each with three blunt, rounded lobes, giving the impression of a duck's footprint. What'll they think of next?

**C. H. h. 'Green Ripple Group'.** Similar to 'California Fan', but with leaves that are smaller, much more heavily textured, and wavy.

**D. H. h. 'Ingrid'.** This is a creamy variegated type with very narrow, finger-like lobes. This makes a fast-growing, colorful component in mixed container plantings.

**E. H. h. 'Merion Beauty'.** Another small-leafed type with three pointy lobes per leaf. This makes finely textured mounds of foliage that turn crimson at the onset of cooler weather.

**F. H. h. 'Midget'.** I don't really understand the name, but this makes fast-growing mats of very finely dissected leaves with long, narrow lobes.

**G. H. h. 'Congesta'.** This forms short, open shrubs of lax stems and tiny, congested leaves. This is quite hardy, our original stock came from Secret Arboretum.

***Jasminum x stephanense*, Hardy Pink Jasmine.**

(sun/psh)(Zones 6-9)(vining)

Well, believe it or not, this is a truly hardy Jasmine. Frank talked about this for a long time and I was very skeptical until I saw it for myself, growing in his mother's backyard on a chain-link fence. Over the years it has made excellent growth producing long green stems with pinnately compound leaves. The small clusters of light-pink, fragrant flowers remind of tropical Jasmines, but lack the overall potency of those plants. The green stems in winter are worth growing the plant for. Fast growing.

***Lonicera periclymenum* 'Harlequin', Variegated Woodbine.**

(sun/psh)(Zones 4-8)(vining)

I feel funny recommending a Honeysuckle, but you have to believe me on this one. The specimen planted on the rockwall at the farm is stunning through spring and fall for its intense white and pink variegation. The coloration contrasts well with the dull grays of the rock and enlivens the whole scene. The plant does bear pretty pink flowers in early summer that are only slightly fragrant when compared to others. This grows rather slowly in the ground and has not shown even the slightest inkling of invasive tendency. Discovered in Ipswich, England.

***Schizophragma hydrangeoides*, Japanese Hydrangea-vine.**

(psh/sh)(Zones 5-7)(vining)

A very close relative of the Japanese Climbing Hydrangea (*H. anomala* var. *petiolaris*) that has more coarsely toothed foliage and does not develop the 3-dimensional character of its cousin. The plant also differs in its flowers that are composed mainly of a cluster of frothy, fertile flowers subtended by showy sterile bracts that

give the overall impression of a Lace-cap Hydrangea. The plant is quite beautiful and can be used for the same applications the other Climbing Hydrangea. Climbs by rootlets, so don't let it grow on anything you intend to save.

**A. S. h. 'Moonlight'**. An uncanny selection that possesses a silvery shading to each leaf that makes them look as though cast from pewter. A must for the collector of variegated plants. All other characteristics the same as the species.
